Finally, at the PUCT, Katherine split her 10-year tenure between advising the commissioners on contested cases and representing the agency in contested electric, telecommunications, and water cases, including litigating before the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH).

This broad experience enables Katherine to advise energy clients on applicable procedural and regulatory requirements within Texas, and more specifically, the ERCOT Market. Having worked within the organizations responsible for developing, interpreting, and enforcing these requirements, she understands not only the rules, but also the considerations behind them.
